Day 1:

Accommodation for 1 night in Bellingham

Check out: Day 2

This down-to-earth all-suite hotel features relaxed studios including free WiFi and flat-screen TVs, as well as living areas with pull-out sofas and desks. All rooms offer minifridges, microwaves and coffeemakers. A hot breakfast buffet, parking and an airport and Alaska Marine Highway shuttle are complimentary. There's a casual restaurant/bar, a BBQ area and a convenience store. Other amenities include an indoor pool, a hot tub and an exercise room.

Day 2:

Ferry from Bellingham to Wrangell with Alaska Marine Highway

Ferry Departure Time: Evening

Ferry Arrival Time: Mid-Afternoon on Day 4

Includes private accommodations in a Two Berth Outside Stateroom

Upgrades to a Four Berth Stateroom may be available. These cabins come with lower bunks, so no climbing required!

Day 4:

Accommodation for 1 night in Wrangell

Check out: Day 5

Located in downtown Wrangell, Alaska, this attractive old house with dormer windows was recently restored by a new generation of the family that has operated it for years. The Rooney family paid special attention to details during the renovation and has furnished this B&B with antiques and antique reproductions to give the Roost a feel of 1900's Alaska.

Wrangell



Wrangell, Alaska, is on an island nestled at the mouth of the mighty Stikine River. The small town offers visitors a friendly taste of an authentic island community amid the unique and pristine wilderness in Alaska. Wrangell is known as the "Gateway to the Stikine River", where friendly people look you in the eye and are happy to help.

Walk amongst petroglyphs and imagine the people who carved them thousands of years ago. Visit Chief Shakes Island and Tribal House, Kik-setti Totem Park and Wrangell Museum for a glimpse into Tlingit Natives way of life. Take in a round of golf at Muskeg Meadows Golf Course. Hike up to Rainbow Falls or stop and pick the abundant wild blueberries, huckleberries and salmonberries.

The most popular day trip from Wrangell is to Anan Wildlife Observatory. Located 30 miles southeast of Wrangell on the mainland, Anan Creek is the site of one of the largest pink salmon runs in the Inside Passage. From the viewing platforms at the observatory, you can watch eagles, harbor seals, black bears and a few brown bears chowing down on the spawning salmon.

Day 5:

Anan Bear and Wildlife Observatory Day Tour w/ Banana Pt. Drop-Off

Duration: 6 Hours

Anan is only accessible by boat, so your tour continues with a comfortable Jet Boat ride to the shore near Anan Creek. After a 1/2-mile hike on a boardwalk, you will arrive at spacious observation decks overlooking two cascading waterfalls. Each summer thousands of spawning salmon attract Brown Bears, Black Bears, Bald Eagles, and seals that feed in the lagoon. The Anan Observatory is located 35 miles southeast of Wrangell on the mainland's Cleveland Peninsula.

5.5 Hour, professionally guided tour includes: local & native history. You'll want to pack a lunch and eat on the boat, both before and after the Anan walk. No food is allowed on the observation platform. Sign up with the Ranger upon arrival for some time in the photo blind at creek level.



One Way Transfer from Banana Point to Petersburg

Duration: 45 Minutes

Shuttle transfer from Banana Point to your Petersburg accommodations.

Accommodation for 2 nights in Petersburg

Check Out: Day 7

Your hotel is located right downtown on Main Street in Petersburg. Complimentary transportation is included, both from the ferry terminal and airport as needed. It has 35 rooms in four stories with a coffee shop next to the comfortable lobby. A light continental breakfast is served for your enjoyment.

Petersburg



This community of roughly 3,000 is centered around its busy and scenic waterfront, which is lined with wharfs, working boats and weathered boathouses, while tidy homes and businesses – many decorated with distinctive flowery Norwegian rosemaling – line the quiet streets. The best examples of rosemaling are seen along Sing Lee Alley, the center of old Petersburg. Most of the street is built on pilings over Hammer Slough and dominated by the Sons of Norway Hall, a large white building that was built in 1912 on pilings. Hammer Slough itself is a delight to photographers providing colorful images of Petersburg's waterfront.

Petersburg lies across Frederick Sound from a spectacular glaciated wall of alpine peaks – including the distinctive Devil's Thumb – that form a skyline of jagged snowcapped summits. Nearby LeConte Glacier discharges icebergs to the delight of visitors. To the south is most of Mitkof Island, where a road system leads visitors to U.S. Forest Service campgrounds, hiking trails, fish ladders and a hatchery and a trumpeter swan observatory. LeConte Glacier lies 25 miles east of Petersburg. Day cruises to view the glacier and flightseeing excursions over the glacier are popular. More adventurous travelers can join guided kayak trips to view the glacier and the seals that often gather on its icebergs. Closer to Petersburg, there are more opportunities to kayak, hike and rent public-use cabins.

One of the most popular activities in Petersburg is whale watching. From mid-May to mid-September humpback whales migrate through and feed in Frederick Sound, northwest of town. The peak feeding period is July and August when you also might spot Steller sea lions, orcas and seals.

Day 6:

Whalewatching

Duration: 8 Hours

The Inside waters of Southeast Alaska are well protected from the weather and are incredibly rich with marine life. Frederick Sound is the summer home to a large humpback whale population, where they can be found feeding and playing from May through September. You may also experience killer whales, Dall's porpoise, Stellar sea lions, harbor seals, and bald eagles while on your tour. Snacks and beverages are included.

Your guide will pick you up at your accommodations 15 minutes prior to your scheduled departure.



Day 7:

Flight from Petersburg to Juneau

Duration: 45 Minutes

Sit back and relax on this scenic flight from Petersburg to Juneau. Fly time is approximately 45 minutes. Each passenger is allowed 3 checked bags for no charge and 2 free carry-on bags when flying in Alaska.

Flight from Juneau to Gustavus

Duration: 30 Minutes

Sit back and relax on this scenic flight from Juneau to Gustavus, Gateway to Glacier Bay National Park. Fly time is 30 minutes. Everyone gets a window seat! Each passenger is allowed up to 50lbs of luggage, but excess may be allowed. Carry-on baggage is stowed by crew before boarding. Make sure you have your camera in your lap for the endless photo opportunities offered on the flight.

Accommodation for 2 nights in Gustavus

Check out: Day 9

Here you'll enjoy cozy hotel room accommodations among the Sitka Spruce trees and relax in the warmth of the lobby's massive stone fireplace. Relax in front of the fireplace in the view lounge area or visit the National Park Services excellent interpretive displays upstairs on the mezzanine.

Gustavus and Glacier Bay







Located just a few miles from park headquarters, the town of Gustavus is the jumping-off point for adventures in Glacier Bay National Park and Preserve and a charming little village of artists, fantastic gardens, wild strawberries, stunning views and even a small golf course.

With its spectacular glaciers and abundance of marine wildlife, Glacier Bay National Park and Preserve has become the crown jewel in the itinerary of many cruise-ship and independent travelers. The bay features seven tidewater glaciers that spill out of the mountains and deposit icebergs of all shapes, sizes and shades of blue into the ocean. Of the park's more than 300,000 annual visitors, over 90 percent visit on a cruise ship and never set foot on shore, but the independent travelers who come get the bonus of visiting nearby Gustavus as well.

Independent travelers can take a short flight from Juneau via jet or air taxi or hop on an Alaska Marine Highway ferry from Juneau. Like many places known for natural beauty, Gustavus boasts several acclaimed sculptors, painters, potters, jewelers and woodcarvers. You can see their work at local galleries, studios and shops in town. Beachcombing, hiking on the Nagoonberry Loop trail, biking through town or playing a round at the Mount Fairweather Golf Course are popular ways to spend the day.

Day 8:

Glacier Bay Day Tour

Duration: 7 Hours

Spend the day on the waters of Glacier Bay and see magnificent tidewater glaciers, ancient snow-capped mountains, whales, stellar sea lions, rare birds such as puffins, coastal bears, seals, eagles, and so much more aboard the comfortable and high-speed catamaran.



Day 9:

Flight from Gustavus to Juneau

Duration: 30 Minutes

Sit back and relax on this scenic flight from Gustavus to Juneau, Alaska's Capital City. Fly time is 30 minutes. Everyone gets a window seat! Each passenger is allowed up to 50lbs of luggage, but excess may be allowed. Carry-on baggage is stowed by crew before boarding. Make sure you have your camera in your lap for the endless photo opportunities offered on the flight.

Accommodation for 2 nights in Juneau

Check Out: Day 11

This B&B features 14 deluxe suites in a unique Victorian-style Farmhouse. Come and spend a blissful night in a plush feather bed and indulge in the wonderful homespun comforts all while being nestled in a quiet rural setting in the Mendenhall Valley. A complimentary full breakfast is provided each morning of your stay. Complimentary transfers to/from the airport or ferry terminal are available.

Juneau



Downtown Juneau sits snugly between Mount Juneau, Mount Roberts and Gastineau Channel, and is a maze of narrow streets running past a mix of new structures, old storefronts and quaint houses featuring early 19th century architecture left over from the town's early gold mining days. The waterfront bustles with cruise ships, fishing boats and floatplanes zipping in and out. With no road access to Juneau, it is the only state capital in the United States that can only be reached by airplane or boat.

Juneau's lively downtown is compact, easy to navigate on foot and always a favorite with visitors. Within easy walking distance of the cruise ship docks are many of Juneau's main attractions, including the state capitol building, Saint Nicholas Russian Orthodox Church, several museums (Alaska State Museum is closed until April 2016) and historic South Franklin Street, where turn-of-the-century buildings today are gift shops, restaurants and pubs. Also nearby is the Juneau Convention & Visitors Bureau with visitor information, displays and walking tour maps of the city.

Just a 15 minute drive from downtown, one of the city's most iconic sites sits at the edge of a residential neighborhood: Mendenhall Glacier. The glacier sits within the Tongass National Forest – the largest national forest in the United States – and visitors to the area can watch icebergs calve off its frozen face into Mendenhall Lake, go for a hike or check out the Mendenhall Glacier Visitor Center. Mendenhall Glacier is one of the 38 major glaciers that extend from the 1,500-square-mile Juneau Icefield, and many of them can be seen from the air as part of a flightseeing tour. Most helicopter tours offer glacier landings, glacier treks and glacier dog sled rides.

Day 10:

Glacier View Sea Kayaking

Glide silently through the water, get an up-close look at wildlife, and enjoy ever-changing views of the Mendenhall Glacier. Just off the shore of North Douglas Island, this sea kayaking location provides the perfect vantage point to take in the grandeur of the Juneau Ice Field. Climb in double kayaks and learn paddling techniques from your experienced guide before pushing off and enjoying an interpretive narrative as you paddle through the Mendenhall Wetlands.

Stealthily approach wildlife—bald eagles, herons, shorebirds and waterfowl can be seen. Keep an eye out for porpoises and even humpback whales that occasionally surface for air. Includes an Alaskan-style snack.



Day 11:

Flight from Juneau to Sitka

Duration: 40 Minutes

Sit back and relax on this scenic flight from Juneau to Sitka. Fly time is approximately 40 minutes. Each passenger is allowed 3 checked bags for no charge and 2 free carry-on bags when flying in Alaska.

Sitka



Sitka is the only Inside Passage community that fronts the Pacific Ocean, hugging Baranof Island's west shore in the shadow of the impressive Mount Edgecumbe, a dormant volcano with a graceful cone reminiscent of Japan's Mount Fuji. Located on Sitka Sound and surrounded by a myriad of small, forested islands, the city of 8,615 residents is marked by the picturesque remnants of its Russian heritage, including the onion-shaped domes and gold colored crosses of the beloved Saint Michael's Russian Orthodox Cathedral.

Although first inhabited by Native Tlingit Indians, Sitka is recognized as the heart of the Russian influence in Alaska. The Russians arrived by 1741 and in 1804 attacked a Tlingit fort. The region's most famous battle eventually led to the creation of Sitka National Historical Park. Originally established as New Archangel, Sitka became the capital of Russian American in 1808. When Russia sold Alaska to the United States on October 18, 1867, the transfer ceremony took place on Sitka's Castle Hill.

Pick up a map from the Visitor's Center in Harrigan Centennial Hall offering several walking tours that highlight the city's history and culture including the Russian Blockhouse, Russian Bishop's House, Princess Maksoutoff's Grave and Castle Hill to name a few, that date back to the Russian era. There are 22 buildings in Sitka on the National Register of Historic Places, so there's plenty to see on a walk through town. Downtown features numerous art galleries, a fine bookstore and gift shops, while the city's main event during the summer is the Sitka Summer Music Festival.

Accommodation for 2 nights in Sitka

Check Out: Day 13

This hotel is conveniently located in downtown Sitka, Alaska on Sitka Harbor, less than two miles from the Sitka Rocky Gutierrez Airport. Your hotel offers guests well-appointed accommodations and local cuisine at the Dock Shack, the restaurant and lounge, which provides patrons spectacular views of the local fishing fleet and Mt. Edgecumbe. Complimentary transfers are provided to and from the airport.

Day 12:

Wildlife Tour

Duration: 2.5 – 5 Hours

Discover Southeast Alaska's majestic landscape and wilderness by cruising Alaska style. Spend your time in Sitka embarking upon a personalized and exciting wildlife boat tour in which you will get to be up close to the magical creatures that are guaranteed to leave you in awe. Experience the smell of whale breath aboard your boat trip. Gaze at the famed puffins and laugh with the curious sea otters as you cruise by.



Day 13:

Flight from Sitka to Seattle

Duration: 2 Hours

Commercial flight from Sitka to Seattle. Each passenger is allowed 2 carry-on bags for free. Checked baggage allowed for a fee.
